



How to Get Involved in Student Activism

If you're interested in advocating for change in your school or community, now is a great time to start. This guide will provide some tips for ways to get involved in activism as a K-12 student.

Join a GSA or Other Identity-Based Affinity Group

GSAs are great spaces to get started in activism. Every club is different — some are primarily social spaces, and others are actively involved in advocating for more inclusive schools for LGBTQ+ youth. Regardless of the mission of your school's club, by joining, you'll be able to form a community of people who may be interested in making a difference in your school or community. Many schools also have affinity groups for other marginalized groups based on race, ethnicity, gender, or religion. Joining any of these groups can be a great way to find a community of activists as well.

Identify LGBTQ+ Groups in Your Community

For some students, school may not be the safest or most welcoming place to delve into advocacy, so you can also look for spaces in your community at-large to get involved. You can also join your local [GLSEN](#) or [PFLAG chapter](#) to find more opportunities for advocacy in your area. You may also be able to find political organizations in your area, and these can be great avenues to get involved in grassroots organizing. Even if you're already involved in a GSA at your school, these networks can be a great opportunity to connect with community leaders and students from other schools.

Find Online Communities

Virtual spaces offer valuable opportunities to connect with activists in your community and around the world. You can follow activist Instagram, Twitter, or TikTok accounts, join an LGBTQ+ Discord server, or subscribe to newsletters from nonprofit organizations.
